OPPORTUNITIES TO STUDY RUSSIAN

Have you always wanted to learn a little bit more about the Russian language? Or do you have friends that were interested in the Russian alphabet and language? This may be the time for you or your friends to explore the possibilities of learning some basic Russian. Non-credit courses for those with little or no background in Russian will begin akewood Community School in St. Petersburg on Wednesday, February 4 at 5:30 pm, and at Manatee Community College in Bradenton on February 3 at 6:30 pm.

The program at Lakewood Community School for those with no background will begin at 5:30 pm. for a two-hour lesson. Those with some background will begin their two-hour lesson at 6:30. The instructor for this course will be William Parsons, Professor of History and Russian Studies at Eckerd College. Text materials for the beginners will be distributed in an orientation session on Wednesday, January 28 at 5:30, or at the first class on February 4 at 5:30. Teach Yourself Beginners Russian will also be used.

"Russian Odyssey": An Outstanding Exhibit

We have in our city an outstanding exhibit of Russian Cultural History at the Florida International Museum. The more than 250 artifacts from the Russian State Museum in St. Petersburg, Russia represent many of the best Russian artists and examples of the most characteristic art trends in Russia during the last 800 years.

In the first section the focus is on religious culture, with a truly remarkable collection of icons. The influence of Peter the Great and Catherine the Great is immediately apparent in secularized Western art of the eighteenth century as well as in the life-size representations of these rulers. In addition to the lavish display of the wealth of the royalty and nobility, one sees the more simple life of the peasantry.

For those who are familiar with nineteenth century Russian art, there are excellen paintings of portraits, landscapes, and everyday life so typical of this period. Look for portraits by Levitsky, Tropinin, Jaroshenko, Repin, and Serov, landscapes by Shishkin and Savrasov, and scenes of everyday life by Venetsianov, Myasoyedov, Makovsky, and others.

Finally, note the exhibits of Russian ballet and the masterpieces of the "World of Art" movement in the Diaghilev epoch. This period at the beginning of the twentieth century represents the time when Russia began to influence the West rather than to imitate Western trends.

If you have not seen the exhibit, it is time to go. If you have gone, encourage your friends to go before the treasures are gone in early April. And don't miss the excellent collections of samovars, Dostoevsky's study, or the porcelain dishes fit for a Tsar.

Student Ambassadors Programs Continue

In the 300/100 anniversary year 2003 Russian Heritage initiated a Student Ambassador Program that brought four Russian high school students to the Tampa Bay area. Two of these students were from Moscow, and two were the winners of a contest in St. Petersburg, Russia to select the best English language students in the city. After the visit of Polina and Dina in September 2003, the Russian Heritage Board decided to continue the program in 2004. The first part of the 2004 program is the visit of two students from the Special School-Lyceum of the St. Petersburg Conservatory named after Rimsky-Korsakov in March 2004 (see below). The second part of our Ambassador Program will be the second English Language Competition for students from St. Petersburg, Russia. Already more than 300 students took part in the first stage of this competition, and the 15 finalists are competing for the two trips to St. Petersburg, Florida for the fall of 2004 on January 31, 2004. We thank Tatiana Bobrovskaya, our Russian Heritage representative in St. Petersburg, Russia for setting up this elaborate program in our namesake city.
