Tatiana Vondersaar and Margo Catsimatidis Honored at 10th Anniversary Old Russian New Year's Celebration!

The Tenth Anniversary Old Russian New Year's Party at the St. Petersburg Yacht Club on January 15 was a special event, with 326 party-goers celebrating the Old Russian New Year with dining, dancing, and an elegant party atmosphere. Tatiana Vondersaar and her daughter, Margo Catsimatidis, were honored this year for their contributions to Russian Heritage, for their service to the Russian-American community in St. Petersburg, and for their role in promoting Russian culture on a large scale. Margo was also cited for her special fund-raising work for Alzheimer's Research and for Greek scholarships. The emcee for the evening, President Carl Kuttler of St. Petersburg College, who is the Honorary Consul for the Russian Federation to the State of Florida, presented beautiful plaques with the seal of the state of Florida to the special honorees, and Congressman Mike Bilirakis read excerpts from his speech in Congress highlighting the achievements of Tatiana Vondersaar and Russian Heritage (see page 4).

The evening started off with an introduction of dignitaries, including Mayor Baker, our honorary host for the evening, a champagne toast to the "old" New Year, and a presentation of Russian folk dances by the Suzanne Pomerantzeff dancers. The dinner entrees featured chicken "Zolotoy Petushok" or Salmon "Zolotaya Rybka". Following dinner a short video program presented scenes of Russia to the music of "Lara's Theme" and the Russian National Anthem performed on Red Square, followed by comments by Boris Marchuk, special assistant to Russian Ambassador Ushakov from Washington.

The Dazzlers provided exciting music for dancing, and a Russian theme was introduced by special Russian songs by Mary Stenov and Emil Katz. The Russian nesting dolls and Russian noisemakers added another special touch to the Russian-ness of the evening. Finally, the fantastic raffle provided outstanding prizes to lucky winners, including a cruise to Mexico in November 2006 (see related story on page 7), and \$1,129 for our scholarship fund. We especially thank Tatiana Vondersaar, Margo Catsimatidis, emcee Carl Kuttler, Congressman Mike Bilirakis, Boris Marchuk, and all the volunteers who put in many hours to prepare and carry out this spectacular event.

Mr. BILIRAKIS. Mr. Speaker, I rise to pay tribute to Tatiana

Poetry Reading: Yevgeny Yevtushenko, acclaimed Russian poet, filmmaker and political activist, will read his poetry at The Studio@620, located in downtown St. Petersburg at 620 First Avenue South. Tickets are \$13 for adults and \$10 for students.

Vevgeny Yevtushenko, Russia's most famous living poet, was born near Irkutsk in Siberia in 1933. He was a leading member of the "new generation" of Russian poets of the 1960's, and became famous for such poems as Babi Yar and Heirs of Stalin which had political messages. He has continued to write political verse, love lyons, and playful poems. He also has written several novels, such as Wild Bernies (1981) and Don't Die Before You're Dead (1995), the second, a novel about the 1991 coup in Russia. He is also an accomplished filmmaker, directing the film Kindergarten (1984) and Stalin's Funeral (1990). He now teaches courses in Russian and European poetry and film at the University of Tulsa in Oklahoma.

Caucasian Ovcharka Another in a series about Russian dogs.

Last Fall, Russian Heritage hosted a group of visiting Russian judges and lawyers at Eckerd College. For the meal, a Russian visitor was placed at each table of Russian Heritage members. I was fortunate to be across the table from Lilia Ilina. When I mentioned my Russian Samoyed dogs, I saw her eyes light up. After the meal, we put our heads together and shared pictures - she of her cherubic faced son at their dacha. She was trying to describe their dog in very good but not entirely complete English as I was listening with very non-Russian cars trying to determine what breed she was describing. We promised to write to each other about our dogs. I did send her an e-mail but then completely forgot about it until I received a very special Christmas card.

In the card from St. Petersburg, Russia, decorated with the Snow Princess and Father Frost, were pictures of Lilia's son and dog with a letter describing the dog and the breed. Lilia wrote that her dog, Karlson, pulls her son's sledge in the winter snow.

"Our dog is sheep-dog Caucasian (wolves killer). These dogs usually live in Russia in Caucasian Mountains. There are no standards for these dogs. They are wide. It's difficult to train, but it is a great housekeeper (guard dog).

Our dog lives in the street (in the country). Last winter, the temperature was $1\text{-}40^{\circ}$ C. at daytime but the dog was in the street and it was ok. "

With that description, I was able to search the internet for more information about the Caucasian Ovcharka (Caucasian Mountain Dog). It is a breed which originated in the Caucasian Mountains and the steppe regions of northern Caucasus and Astrakhan. While conventional wisdom dictates that they originated sometime during the Middle Ages, more recent information uncovered in the form of a skull may place their origin in the Stone Age. They weigh between 70 and 160lb. and are 26-32" at the shoulders - a great wooly dog! The dogs in the mountainous regions are more massive and bear like and those on the steppes are rangier, leggier and have shorter coats. The coats can be gray to fawn to brindle and occasionally white. By nature, they are protective, territorial, suspicious, trainable and willing workers. Amazingly, they are family oriented and good with children. They are hardy dogs and deal very well with extremes of temperatures. In the United States, they are registered by UKC and the American Kennel Club is beginning to collect breeding records on them.

So now that we add the Caucasian Ovcharka to our list of Russian dogs-Samoyed, Siberian Husky, Borzoi, Black Russian Terrier - we can even more fully appreciate Russia's great contribution to the canine world. And I certainly appreciate a fellow dog lover's sharing her dog's story from so many miles away. Thank you, Lilia.
