



Highlights of the Year in Russia

Daria Dontsova heads rating of Russian Fiction Writers. The author of ironic detectives Daria Dontsova has become the leader in best-sellers in Russia. She has the most copies of her books in print, and the most titles (68) currently in print. For non-Russian writers the leaders are Danielle Steel, Sidney Sheldon, and Joanna Chmielewska.

For the first time ever the Hollywood company of Disney has launched production of a Russian film.

The fairy tale movie under the title Book of Masters will be produced jointly with Nikita Mikhalkov's studio "TriTe". Disney Studio promises to make something in traditions of the famous Soviet children's film Morozko (1964), but with large-scale battle scenes and visual effects.

The role of Kashchey the Immortal, a traditional character of Russian fairy tales, will be performed by the now popular Russian actor Gosha Kutsenko. There will be also Baba-Yaga, mermaids and fairy warriors. Nikita Mikhalkov and Disney



Winners of the annual National Contest "Book of the Year" have been announced. Grand Prize went to Yuri Rost with his photo album "Group Portrait Against Background of Century". The prizes were given in ten nominations. In Humanitas nomination the winner is Lyudmila Saraskina with her book "Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn". Among the winners there is also: Vladimir Sharov's "Be Like Children" (Prose of the Year) and collected poems "All Yevtushenko: Verses and Poems 1937-2007" (Poetry of the Year). The ceremony of award traditionally was held in the framework of the Moscow International Book Exhibition Fair open from September 3.

Nanny of Pushkin, Arina Rodionovna, is set in stone. A monument to Pushkin's nanny was unveiled in the Kaluga region of Russia. . . A monument to Fyodor Dostocvsky was set up in Greece. . . A biographical film about Leo Tolstoy is being shot in Germany, starring Christopher Plummer and Helen Mirren as the writer and his wife. . . A new translation of Bulgakov's Master and Margarita captivates Japan. . .

With the death of Russian writer and philosopher Alexandr Solzhenitsyn, many honors have been established. A Solzhenitsyn Museum will open in Kislovodsk, the writer's native city. Solzhenitsyn Street will replace Bolshaya Kommunisticheskaya Street located in the center of Moscow. Solzhenitsyn died on August 3 at age 89 and was buried in the Donskoe Cemetery in Moscow.
