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A Second Musical Program For Spring

Saturday, March 10, 2007 at 2:00 pm

The first program in the spring series examined the connection between Russian folk music and concert music of the nineteenth century. About 40 people attended this program, the workshops on choral music and balalaika lessons, and the sing along of favorite Russian songs. For the second program, there will be a focus on Russian poetry in the works of composers of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. We will also have a workshop for balalaika players at 1:30 pm, and group singing following the program, with some of the songs we tried in February, and some new ones.

Again taking part in the program will be Vladimir Khokhlov, pianist; Serge Boldireff, tenor; Vladislav Markov, bass; Andre Cheine, bayanist; and others. If you enjoyed our first program we hope to see you again, and bring your friends. If you didn't come to our first program, we hope to see you this time.

The program will be at Lewis House at Eckerd College (Go right at the traffic circle, towards the chapel, and park in the lot on the right near Lewis House.) The program is free and open to the public.

Russian Booth at SPIFFS Folk Fair in Vinoy Park

Russian Heritage will operate the Russian village at the 32rd Annual SPIFFS Folk Fair on March 14-18 in Vinoy Park in downtown St. Petersburg. The first three days will be for school students, and Saturday and Sunday will open to the public. There will be more than 30 ethnic groups represented with cultural displays, entertainment from around the globe, and exotic foods! Sunday will have a special focus on Hispanic culture.

The Russian Village will feature a Russian cultural exhibit by Russian Heritage, souvenirs and art works for sale by Vladimir's Collection, Russian foods prepared by the St. Petersburg Nights restaurant, and a special appearance by the Russian show dogs, the Samoyeds, who were brought to America just more than 100 years ago by a Belgian princess who lived in Tampa the last years of her life. Russian entertainment will be provided by The Academy of Ballet Arts on Wednesday at 1:30 pm and at 10:40 am on Saturday. Serge Boldifeff and Andrey Chiene will perform on Friday.

The opening ceremonies and the Parade of Nations will take place on Saturday at 1:00 pm. The Fair will open for the general public on Saturday (10 am to 10 pm) and on Sunday (noon to 6:00 pm). The closing ceremonies will be at 5:30 pm on Sunday.
