



Built as a residence for Ivan I, the Kremlin was the official residence of the Czars until the 1917 Russian Revolution. Today, it houses the President's office. In front of the Kremlin is Red Square – an impressive and exuberant plaza. Rising from the square is St Basil's Cathedral, built in the 1550s to commemorate Ivan the Terrible's capture of the Mongol stronghold of Kazan.

On April 21, for the first time this season, workers of the tourist information Angels Service (most of them are students of department of foreign languages of Saint-Petersburg universities) returned to streets of Russia's second capital. Ten "angels" are working in pairs at central St. Petersburg. Three police patrols are accompanying the workers of the Angels Service. As soon as the high season begins, the number of "angels" will increase to 60 people (The Angels Service is a mobile tourist information service established to provide visitors of St. Petersburg from all over Russia and abroad with effective information assistance). The "angels" are working in Central, Admiralteysky, Vasileostrovsky and Petrogradsky districts in Saint-Petersburg, in the places of tourist flows. Don't miss this opportunity – it's free!

RUSSIAN BREEDS: RUSSIAN GOLD

by Peggy Newton Russia has a tumultuous history steeped in culture. Authors Pushkin and Tolstoy, composers Tchaikovsky and Rimsky-Korsakov, artists Bakst and Repin, just to name a few, are responsible for Russia's prominence among the great cultural centers of western Europe like Paris, London and Rome.

Yet, commonly, a major barometer of Russian history and culture is overlooked - its native dog and cat breeds. On Saturday, March 31, this was not the case when Russian Heritage presented the educational program Russian Breeds: Russian Gold. At that program, five Russian breeds were presented in person and their history and use discussed.

The ambiance was set as attendees filed in while balalaika tunes played. They were greeted by costumed Board members. Russian Heritage's own Mary Stenov presented her Russian Blue Cat, Calypso, whose ancestors had been brought from Archangel in northwestern Russia to England where the breed was appreciated for its calm, tranquil disposition. This was aptly demonstrated as Calypso was presented in a room full of canines and didn't bat an eye even when the Siberian Husky gave him a protracted stare.

The Husky, Ch. Echota's Cassanova, CD, CGC, Therapy Dog "Cass", came from Valrico with his owner Linda Van Cleve. She made it clear that the breed had originated on the eastern coast, near the Bering Strait with the Chukchi Indians. The Siberian Huskies were raised as family friendly, low maintenance sled dogs of great endurance and speed. A famous Siberian Husky was Balto who led the sled team which saved Nome by hurriedly delivering diphtheria serum. Ironically, during the Cold War, there was a statue of the Russian Balto in New York City.

Though Samoyeds are often mistaken for Huskies, the Samoyed, Rapture's Moustan of Kenway - "Moustan" owned by John and Julie Jeffries was presented as being from a totally different area in north western Russia near the Arctic Circle. Samoyeds had been used as reindeer herders by the Samoyed people who also used them to pull sleds and to warm their reindeer skin hut homes. Samoyeds are totally family friendly and their hair can be used to make angora-like garments. Their name, meaning "he who eats himself" originated when the czar's troops invaded the east and found the Samoyed people drinking reindeer blood - as much a misnomer as our Native Americans being called Indians.

The Black Russian Terrier, Ch. Russian Guard Danko Ares - "Onyx", presented by Laura Manis from Orlando awed everyone there with his cheerful enormity. We learned that the BRT originated during the Stalin era when a heavy, strong and resilient work dog was needed by the military. The Red Star Kerurel in Moscow produced the breed the breed of Bouvier, Giant Schnauzer, Rottweiler and others. They are intelligent and protective working dogs. nterestingly, their eyes are covered with hair so that, when on night missions, the gleam of the eye does not reveal its

Also a large dog, the Borzoi, formerly known as the Russian Wolfhound, was represented by Ch. Laureate Majestic Light. - "Trevor" and his owner, Monica Barry from Brooksville. Monica described the Borzoi as a sight hound always associated with the hunts of the nobility. When the series were freed in 1860, they would have become extinct if it were not for the Grand Duke Nicholas. Then, at the time of the Revolution, most Russian Borzoi had been slaughtered - guilt by association. Fortunately, the United States and Great Britain maintained the breed and reinvigorated it in Russia after Perestroika. Now shows are planned for St. Petersburg, Russia, once again.
