The plans for the Russian Films
Festival are going forward for November,
but we have had to scale back our plans
somewhat. The director we had invited was
not able to come and bring his film as we
had announced in the last newsletter. The
new schedule of activities is included in this
newsletter, and you will be hearing more
about this in the near future.

ST. PETERSBURG RUSSIAN FILM FESTIVAL ST. PETERSBURG, FLORIDA NOVEMBER 1998

One good way to learn about a country's current culture is to see its films. Tampa Bay residents will have a chance to do just that November 5-9 when the St. Petersburg group "Russian Heritage" and Eckerd College present THE ST. PETERSBURG RUSSIAN FILM FESTIVAL.

The festival begins with a preview of the films to be shown, and a roundtable discussion on the state of contemporary Russian cinema at Eckerd College on Thursday, November 5th. Participating in this opening event will be Professors Sergei Novikov and Bill Parsons of Eckerd College, and Professor Victor Peppard of the University of South Florida in Tampa. On the following three days a series of Russian films will be shown on the Eckerd campus. Two of these film programs will be repeated at the St. Petersburg Museum of Bistory on November 8th and 9th.

The feature films shown at the St. Petersburg Russian Film Festival will include "The Thief", nominated for an Oscar as the best foreign film of 1997; two recent films about the city of St. Petersburg, Russia in a time of transition after the fall of Communism; two classics by Sergei Eisentein; and several animated Russian folk tales and stories. More information about the films planned for the festival are listed on the back page.

Viewing films about contemporary St. Petersburg Russia will not give an exact picture of what life is like in Russia today, just as watching many American films might give a distorted view of life here. However, these films have been chosen to present a cross-section of contemporary Russian experiences that will be of interest to the American audience.

The retrospective of the films by Eisenstein is particulary appropriate this year, because it is the 100th anniversary of his birth, the 50th anniversary of his death, the 70th anniversary of "Ten Days That Shook the World", and the 60th anniversary of "Alexander Nevsky". Although they have an element of historical propaganda in them, they are classic statements of Soviet, and in fact, world cinema.

The theme of ANIMATED RUSSIAN FILMS will delight children of all ages. Three classic features based on Russian folklore, "Beauty and the Beast: A Tale of the Crimson Flower", "The Magic Borse" (on the Firebird theme), and "The Twelve Months" will be shown. Children's animated cartoons will also be featured. "You're Going to Get It!" is a Russian series similar to the American Roadrunner cartoons, and "Alice and the Mystery of the Third Planet" is a children's adventure story. The most recent animated film at the festival will be "Rusalka" (the Mermaid) — a classic fairy tale about a young man who falls in love with a mermaid. This Russian short film was nominated for an Oscar for the best animated film in 1998.
