#### TCHAIKOVSKY LECTURE/CONCERT - JANUARY 26TH

"THE VOCAL LYRIC OF P. I. TCHAIKOVSKY" will be the subject of a lecture/concert presented by Vladimir Khokhlov in the Marly Room of the Fine Arts Museum on Tuesday, January 26th from 6:00 to 6:00 PM. Providing examples of Tchaikovsky's music will be Elena Lewenson, suprano of the Minsk Musical Theater and Eduard Chudakov, Baritone of the Latvian National Opera. Lecturer, soloist, and accompanist for this program will be Vladimir Khokhlov, graduate of the St. Petersburg Conservatory in Russia, and now member of our Russian Heritage Board of Directors. This lecture/concert is free to members and friends of Russian Heritage, with a free-will offering taken.

This lecture on Tchaikovsky was originally scheduled for our February meeting. Note that it will now take place on JANUARY 26th. And note also that it will be a good introduction to two Tchaikovsky programs coming in February. On Friday, February 26th the Russian National Ballet will present the ballet "SWAN LAKE" at Ruth Eckerd Hall, and on Saturday, February 27th The Florida Orchestra will present "Totally Tchaikovsky" - a night devoted to the music of the Russian master.

#### MARCH MEETING TO FOCUS ON RUSSIAN FOLK CULTURE IN TAMPA

The March meeting for Russian Heritage will take place in Tampa, and will feature Russian Folk Art, Folk Music, and Folk Culture. The date will be Friday evening March 19th at 7:00 PM. The place will be announced shortly.

Many people in the Tampa Bay area have interesting examples of Russian Folk Art. Our hosts in Tampa will be presenting a number of special examples, and members and friends of Russian Heritage are invited to bring special items from their own personal collections.

# The Nativity of Our Lord Jesus Christ

#### THE ICON:

The Theotokos and Child-the central figures; she is depicted reclining upon a blanket, and He in a mange fodder bin.

Saint Joseph-the Guardian of Christ and His Mother; tradition relates that Joseph was an elderly widower, I having white hair and beard, he is depicted being tempted by Satan to doubt the virgin-birth.


Satan-the figure in the lower center, he is depicted as an elderly hunchback tempting Saint Joseph; wherea else in the icon should be done in bright colors, Satan, the Prince of Darkness, is portrayed in dark, drab garmen

A Shepherd-the figure on the right, he is depicted facing the angels as they announce the glad tidings of the birt the Messiah.

The Magi-the figures on the left, they are depicted following the star, which is in the top center, and carrying t gifts, tradition speaks of their being representative of all mankind . . . one being young (beardless), one bi middle-aged (in the center of the group), and one being elderly (closest to the cave).

The Angels—the group on the left offers worship to Christ, the group of the right announces the glad tidings shepherd (one is depicted speaking to the shepherd while the other points to the cave in Bethlehem).

The Cow and The Star-illustrate that all creation rejoices at the birth of the Messiah, the lowly and the great, earthly and the heavenly.

Alexander Sergeyevich Pushkin, Russia's greatest poet, was born on June 6, 1799. For his 200th birthday party, we are planning a special celebration in St. Petersburg, Florida. "Pushkin in the Park" will feature Russian music and dancing, Russian poetry, Russian food, and much more.

In June 1998 in Russia it was announced that from June 1998 until June 1999, the entire year would be dedicated to the preparation of the 200th anniversary of the poet's birth. ### Language Corner

Most members of Russian Heritage know Russian well, but for those who are not experienced in Russian, we will at times include a short section of Russian Language information. Those who are Russian or who know Russian well might use this information to share with friends who do not know Russian.

A good place to start, of course, is with the Russian (Cyrilic) alphabet. If you need help with the alphabet, please contact Russian Heritage, and we can get you started. In this lesson we give the words in the Russian alphabet, the sounds in English, the meaning in English, and some commentary about the words and phrases. The syllable in capital letters is the syllable that receives the stress in the word or phrase.

> Russian Words С ПРАЗДНИКОМ!

English Sounds SPRAZ-ni-kom

English Meaning Happy Holiday!

This may be a good first phrases to learn in Russian. It means Happy Holiday! But it can be a generic greeting for Merry Christmas! Happy New Year! Happy Birthday! Happy Easter! or it may be an appropriate for any Church Holiday in the Orthodox Calendar.

This is a most appropriate greeting for Russian Christmas (January 7) and New Year's Eve or New Year's Day (January 13 & 14).

> The more formal greeting for these days is as follows: Russian Words с новым годом С РОЖДЕСТВОМ христовыы! с праздником!

English Words SNO-veem GO-dom! srazh-dyest-VOM Hrees-TO-veem

English Meaning Happy New Year! Merry Christmas!

SPRAZ-ni-kom! Happy Holiday!
