# St. Petersburg takes a day to celebrate Pushkin

■ The Russian Heritage group has planned a day of readings and music to introduce residents to "a people's poet."

ST. PETERSBURG — Sunday has been declared Alexander Sergeyevich Pushkin Day in St. Petersburg.

Mayor David Fischer issued the proclamation in recognition of the renowned Russian poet, who was born June 6, 1799.

Joining Pushkin devotees around the globe in a celebration of the poet's birth will be the Russian Heritage organization, a local group formed three years ago to promote that country's culture.

The group has planned a program featuring readings from selections of Pushkin's masterpieces as well as musical interpretations of his works. A video of the poet's life also will be shown. The celebration will take place Sunday, from 2 to 5 p.m., at the St. Petersburg Museum of Fine Arts.

Bill Parsons, president of the Russian Heritage organization and professor of history and Russian studies at Eckerd College, says an afternoon of Pushkin can be appealing to poetry lovers as well as those normally lukewarm toward the art.

"He's Russia's most popular poet," Parsons said, adding that Pushkin also is "a people's poet."

#### If you go

Pushkin Day in St. Petersburg, 2 to 5 p.m., Sunday, St. Petersburg Museum of Fine Arts, 255 Beach Drive NE. The program will feature Pushkin's poetry, recited in English and Russian, and music by Tchaikovsky, Mussorgsky, Glinka and Borodin, based on the poet's works. Music will be performed by Russian singers Svetlana Strezeva and Michael Shevtsov-Pronsky. Russian folk dances will be performed by the St. Petersburg Folk Ensemble under the direction of Suzanne Pomerantzeff. Free. Call 864-8235.

Pushkin's African ancestry also makes him interesting, he said, for Pushkin addressed the subject in his works.

Known for such masterpieces as Eugene Onegin, Pushkin was the great-grandson of Abram Hannibal, who is believed to have been born in Ethiopia. Hannibal was captured and taken to Russia, where he became a servant of the czar and later his godson. Hannibal became highly educated and later distinguished himself as a military engineer. One of his sons' daughters, who married into Russian nobility, was Pushkin's mother.

"He was a child prodigy," Parsons said of the poet, who was a ladies' man and died in a duel at 37.

"A lot of people compare him to Mozart."
