Russian Heritage began began the year 2003 with a spectacular Old Russian New Year's Gala at the Yacht Club on January 12. During this special anniversary year of the 300th anniversary of the founding of St. Petersburg, Russia, and the 100th anniversary of St. Petersburg, Florida, many special activities were planned by the city of St. Petersburg and its special anniversary planning committee, as well as our own special projects of symposiums, museum exhibits, and exchanges of student ambassadors. We intend to bring this anniversary year to a climax with our 2004 Old Russian New Year's Party on Sunday, January 11, again at the St. Petersburg Yacht Club. We encourage all members and friends of Russian Heritage who are planning to attend this activity to respond soon to reserve your place at the festivities.

Russian Heritage Program on Summer Delegations to Russia: November 14.
 In May, Mayor Rick Baker and Dr. Carl Kuttler of St. Petersburg College led a city delegation to Moscow and St. Petersburg for anniversary events that resulted in a partnership agreement between the two St. Petersburgs on a wide range of intergovernmental issues. An official video of this trip was produced and will be shown at the November Russian Heritage meeting.

An Eckerd College group, which included a number of members of Russian Heritage, participated in a river cruise from St. Petersburg to Moscow in July. While in St. Petersburg, the Russian Heritage museum exhibit and a symposium on the two St. Petersburgs were organized at the History Museum at the Peter-Paul Fortress. 2. RUSSIAN ODYSSEY: RICHES OF THE STATE RUSSIAN MUSEUM November 2, 2003 – April 4, 2004 at the Florida International Museum

For the first time, over 250 superlative objects from The State Russian Museum in St. Petersburg, Russia have left their home and come to the United States. Artifacts span over 800 years of Russian history and focus on themes such as religious culture, the life of the Tsars, a comparison of the life of noblemen and peasants, and other cultural elements such as the ballet.

These items are now on display at the Florida International Museum (100 Second Street North, in downtown St. Petersburg), and they represent a remarkable contribution to Russian culture, history, and heritage.

3. DANCERS ANDREI USTINOV AND ELENA MARTINSON PRESENT A PROGRAM OF CLASSICAL MUSIC AND DANCE AT THE PALLADIUM

SPECIAL BIRTHDAYS IN NOVEMBER

Anatole Sokolsky was born in Lithuania on November 11, 1903, the same year that St. Petersburg, Russia celebrated its 200 year anniversary and St. Petersburg, Florida was incorporated as a city. Anatole was honored last year as the Russian Heritage honorary member of the year for his contributions to the promotion of Russian culture and his researches and his persistence in recognizing the contributions of Peter Demens to the history of St. Petersburg, Florida. He was instrumental in popularizing Demens, encouraging the city to honor him by naming a city waterfront park "Demens Landing", and working with the Russian community to place a monument to Demens in the park. He has written several books, most recently his autobiography Through War Revolution and Peace in 1998. In May he was interviewed for a Russian TV special about Demens and St. Petersburg, Florida which was shown throughout Russia. Professor Sokolsky lives at 914 Pelican Drive, St. Petersburg, FL 33707.

Tania Vondersaar is also celebrating a pivotal birthday on November 14, but she is not yet ready to join the century club. Tania has been on the board of Russian Heritage since its birth in 1996, and she has served as Vice President, President, or Chair of the Board for most of these years. Tania has been honored for two years in a row as one of the Mayor's volunteers of the year for her work with Russian Heritage, SPIFFS, her presentations on Russian culture to various organizations (almost always in one of her magnificent Russian costumes!), and her work as a translator and volunteer. She has been indeed one of the faces that many people identify with Russian culture and heritage. Tania lives at 5443 Fourth Avenue South, St. Petersburg, FL 33707.
