### Russian Doctor Shares Her Experience

On September 7, 2007 "Russian Heritage" sponsored a program in which Dr. Lidia Kustova of St. Petersburg, Russia reported on the Health Care System in Russia. The following is a report written by Russian Heritage president Nadia Yevstigneyeva, who graduated from the same medical academy in St. Petersburg.

Our visiting doctor Lidia Kustova reported to us what has happened in Russia during the last ten years in the health care system. Lidia graduated from the St. Petersburg Pediatric Academy in 2000 and since then she has worked as an ultrasound specialist in one of the leading emergency care hospitals in the city of St. Petersburg. Lidia pointed out that in the Russian Federation the health care system differs greatly between large cosmopolitan cities, especially Moscow and Saint Petersburg, and remote areas of the country, where people have a much lover level of care and very little choice. Has the situation improved, and is Russia in practice addressing the problems created by the lack of integration, vertical treatment structures, and over specialization?

Members of Russian Heritage and the Russian-American Club were interested in the current situation of medical insurance and its coverage and accessibility for the population; demographical issues caused by high death rates and low birth rates; issues with medical treatment and medications; infectious diseases in the hospitals; and advanced training for specialists such as surgeons. The role of local polyclinics and pediatric care for infants were also discussed. The highlights of Lidia's presentation included the fact that free medical insurance for each Russian citizen is still in place and works quite well in large cities where there is a sufficient health care establishment. Over the counter medication is accessible for the population, but it is quite expensive for most old people and the poor. The birthrate is at the lowest level in the history of Russia and some very strange efforts have been made by the government to increase it. Life expectancy is very low and the gap between American and Russian levels is extremely large (12 years for men and 9 for women). The extremely low salaries of medical doctors, the high reputation of medical professionals, and the extremely competitive entrance exams to the medical schools - these were just a few of the additional observations made by Lidia in our discussions.

Listening to Lidia's presentation gave us some positive feelings that the Russian Health System can survive as long doctors like Lidia will be dedicated to serving the country and its people. However, the Minister of Health, Zurabov, has not been popular among medical community in Russia and he did not bring any important improvements to the health system. His name was mentioned several times at the meeting with Lidia. But there may be good news. After Lidia returned to Russia, President Putin replaced Zurabov with Tatiana Golikova. She formerly served in the Ministry of Finance. Let's hope that this change will help Russia and its citizens to get better health care and medical services soon.

### FAMOUS RUSSIANS OUTSIDE OF RUSSIA AFTER THE REVOLUTION

A documentary film made by the most famous of contemporary Russian film makers will be shown on Sunday, October 21 at 3:00 pm in the Miller Auditorium at Eckerd College.

Nikita Mikhalkov's "RUSSKIE BEZ ROSSII" (Russians Deprived of Russia) documents the stories of the Russian commanders of the White Army and their men after the Civil War in Russia following the Bolshevik Revolution. Featured in this film are Kolchak, Denikin, and Wrangel and their contributions to the Russian Empire before and during WWI, and their fate after the victory of the Bolsheviks. Interviews with descendants of these leaders and those who chose to leave Russia for better times in Western Europe after 1921 are featured, often in conversation with Nikita Mikhalkov himself.

The film is in Russian with English subtitles. A brief introduction to the film will be given by historian William Parsons, Professor Emeritus of Eckerd College.

### NICK WHITE IN RUSSIA

Dear Russian Heritage,

Hpuber! So far everything here in the Russian Federation has been going very well. I have a premiere coming up very soon, actually this coming Thursday the 25th of October. It is a piece for Solo Cello and will be played by a fellow first year student from Uzbekistan named Dmitri Yanov-Yanovich. It will be premiered in the wonderful Alexander Glazanov Hall, in which I have seen several concerts now, including one last week featuring the music of my composition professor Sergei Michaelavich Slonimsky. Studying with a composer of his caliber has been and is an incredible honor. He is rather demanding, but incredibly talented as a composer and teacher. I never thought I could learn so much from one single person.

I am so grateful to Russian Heritage for the opportunity you have afforded me here in St. Petersburg. My composition class consists of approximately 12 students most of whom are Russian. Fortunately, my Russian is steadily getting better and I understand more and more. I have also taken the large step of adding Russian characters to my computer keyboard. Boxee Moë! So far as I know I am the only American in the dorms and only one of 3 in the conservatory itself. Surprisingly, however, I've assimilated very well and most everyone has little interest in where you're from – only who you are and what kind of musician you are. My class load is very large but manageable. I take 15 hours of Russian, along with 6 hours of composition, 1 ½ hours of Solfeggio, 1 ½ hours of Harmony, 1 ½ hours of Score Reading, and 1 hour of Piano per week. Basically there is a lot to be done and not so much time to do it.

With regards to Russia itself, I am immensely enjoying my time here. By far the most awe inspiring place I have seen is the Alexander Nevsky Monastery and Tikhvin Cemetery. I saw the graves of Dostoyevsky, Mussorgsky, Borodin, Glazanov, Rubenstein, Rimsky-Korsakov, and of course Tchaikovsky. I must have stood at Tchaikovsky's grave for an hour just in absolute amazement. It was hard to imagine that I was literally 6 feet from the actual man! My heart collapsed in my chest. To be in such a place was just beyond all possible imagination. I take Solfeggio in a class room that Dmitri Shostakovich occupied for 15 years and I still have yet to get over the feeling. One of my great idols, sat here everyday for 15 years. It is just unreal. Someone pinch me so that I can wake up.

My biggest thanks to Russian Heritage and all who have helped make this possible for their generous contributions to my education and to my life really. With the education I'm receiving here I could surely do anything I want. Thank you all so much. You can not possibly imagine what you've given me already, and I've only having been here 2 months. I owe you so much.

Thank you all so much. I look forward to my next update. Спасибо большое!
