Friday, September 10. "Inaugural Meeting." We will meet at 6:00 pm at O'Gradney's Restaurant (6661 Central Avenue, St. Petersburg) for a buffet supper (choice of Salmon with Dill Sauce and Chicken Tetrazzini, plus many side options) for \$15.00. We will hear about the plans for the year, introduce our new officers, and hear brief highlights from the "Pushkin Day" CD. Please RSVP by September 7th to 367-2092.

Sunday, October 10. Russian Picnic in Odessa. We encourage members and friends of Russian Heritage to participate in the Russian Picnic sponsored by the Sisterhood of St. Andrew's Church. Please see article on page 4.

Tuesday, November 9. Tchaikovsky/Pushkin Film Festival at Eckerd College.

An afternoon and evening of films featuring Russian culture through the music and poetry of Peter Tchaikovsky and Alexander Pushkin. All three film experiences are shown in Dendy Auditorium at Eckerd College. They are free and open to the public.

2:00 pm: A film collage on the life and works of Peter Tchaikovsky. Highlights

from the Russian film "Tchaikovsky" and the British film "Music Lovers".

4:00 pm: "Eugene Onegin." Russian Language Film of the Opera by Tchaikovsky based on the Pushkin poem. (with English subtitles)

7:00 pm: "The Queen of Spades." Russian Language Film of the Opera by Tchaikovsky based on the short story by Pushkin.

Tuesday, December 14. Business meeting of the Board of Directors open to the general membership. Plans for the year 2000, with special attention to the Russian New Year Millennium Celebration. St. Petersburg Junior College (Allstate Campus) at 7:00 pm.

Friday, January 14, 2000. "The Russian New Year Millennium Celebration."

The fourth annual Russian New Year's Celebration will be held at the St. Petersburg Yacht Club. We are planning a special event for this Russian New Year, with special guests and activities. Details to follow, but mark your calendars now.

Early February, 2000. We do not have the exact time, place, or performers, but we are planning a concert of Russian classical music that you won't want to miss. Check later issues of this newsletter for the February event.

Tuesday, March 14. "Third Annual Russian Songfest." This year's event will continue the tradition of group singing (in Russian), but will add two new features. First, we will add a number of games to play (some in Russian, some in English). Second, this will be "potluck" meal, with members of Russian heritage bringing Russian foods. We will coordinate the menu items, and we hope that you will bring some recipies that can be used in the "Russian cookbook" being prepared by the Sisterhood of St. Andrew's Church. (More on that later.) The "Songfest" will be in the Clubhouse of the Silver Sands Condominium on St. Pete Beach.

April Meeting TBA. This will be our election of new officers. But we will also plan a program to be announced at a later date.

May 1, 2, and/or 3. "Peter Demens Event." May 1, 2000 is the 150th anniversay of the birth of Peter Demens (see article on page 7). As you may remember from last year, Russian Heritage is collecting funds to help support an exhibit devoted to Peter Demens in Tver and St. Petersburg for this anniversary year. We are now planning to work together with community groups to sponsor a symposium, conference, or other major event in our area to honor this founding father of our city. 

Peter Demens and Demens Landing

To many local people as well as to most tourists, the waterfront park in downtown St. Petersburg conjures up images of pirates and demons rather than one of the founding fathers of our city. The Board of Directors of "Russian Heritage", a local organization founded to promote Russian culture in the Tampa Bay area, has set for itself the goal to correct this false notion and to honor Peter Demens and his role in the city's history in this the 150th anniversary of Demens' birth.

Peter Demens (pronounced de MENS) was born on May 1, 1850 on the estate of his father in rural Russia. He came from an aristocratic background and he served in the Imperial Guards in St. Petersburg, Russia before retiring to his estates in the Tver province of Russia. He came to America in 1881 and settled in Florida. He brought the Orange Belt Railroad from Central Florida to the Gulf Coast in 1888, and was responsible for the naming of St. Petersburg, Florida in honor of the Imperial Russian capital. In 1889 he moved to North Carolina and he later took up residence in California.

There are at least four ways to remember how to pronounce Demens properly.

- Think of the World War II general of France Charles DeGaulle, and remember that Demens also is stressed on the final syllable.
- 2) Reflect on his Russian last name Dementyev (pronounced de-MEN-tyeff) and replace the final syllable (tyev) with the letter (s), thus DeMENS from DeMENtyev.
- The Demens' family offers the following humorous memory aid: Women go to de LADIES' room; Men go to de MEN'S room.
- 4) The following poem may also help you remember:

Call Him DeMENS

- The family and friends
 Of Peter Demens
 As one recommends
 We all make amends
 And call him Demens.
- He's not Samuel Clemens, He's not Peter Demens; Don't say Seaman's Landing, Don't say Demon's Landing.
- He's Peter Demens
 To family and friends,
 So let's make amends
 And call him Demens

Now that you have a good idea of who Peter Demens is and how his name should be pronounced, please spread the word. Don't let friends say "Demon's Landing", and remind one and all that Peter Demens brought the railroad to St. Petersburg and built a railroad pier on the land that is now the Demens' Landing in downtown St. Petersburg.
