A Tribute to Aleksander Solzhenitsyn

Nobel Prize winner for literature, Russian nationalist, and chronicler of communist repression, Alexander Solzhenitsyn, died of heart failure on August 3, 2008.

He was best known in the West for his best-sellers *One Day in the Life of Ivan Denisovich* and *The Gulag Archipelago*. These and other works documented the evils of Communist system of oppression and he was expelled from the Soviet Union in 1974, living as a recluse in Vermont. After the fall of the Soviet Union he returned to Russia in 1994.

Although he is well-known as a critic of communism, he was also critical of the West, and is often seen as something of a prophet of Slavophile Russian nationalism based on the values of Russian orthodoxy. Ironically, he was born in the first year of the Bolshevik Revolution, and he was in the first group of Russian Octobrists and Pioneers, and was in the first class of students to graduate with a completely Soviet education. Apparently in his case the indoctrination did not work. Вечная Память!

Мэр Нью-Йорка поздравил русскую общину: вы подарили нам вертолет, телевидение и Google

Русские в США внесли огромный вклад в их развитие. Это признал мэр Нью-Йорка Майкл Блумберг, который поздравил русскую общину мегаполиса в связи с проходящим фестивалем культуры "Наше наследие", передает РИА "Новости".

Церемония чествования русских нью-йоркцев состоялась в главном центре искусства деловой столицы мира - музее Метрополитен, в роскошном египетском зале с алтарем и древними сфинксами, отражающимися в глади декоративного бассейна. Фестиваль русской культуры "Наше наследие", организованный российско-американским фондом, который известен своими проектами с большим театром, Московской новой оперой, театром "Современник" на Бродвее, проводится уже в шестой раз при поддержке города.

"Русскоязычная община самых разных вероисповеданий оказала огромная влияние на культуру мегаполиса, начиная от Стейтен-айленда и до Брайтон-бич. Русские подарили Америке вертолет, телевидение и Google", - отметил Блумберг на торжественной церемонии.

Он напомнил о том вкладе в развитие мирового прогресса, который внесли выходцы из России Игорь Сикорский, запатентовавший в 1910 году вертолет, Владимир Зворыкин и Давид Сарнов, создавшие и запустившие 30-е годы в производство телевизор.

Блумберг признал русской империю Google, которую основали в 1998 году студенты Стенфордского университета Ларри Пейдж и Сергей Брин - выходец из СССР.

РИА "Новости" также дополняет Блумберга: русские также создавали Нью-Йоркский балет, оперу, кинематограф, музыку и живопись. Русскоязычная община Нью-Йорка и пригорода составляет около 200 тысяч человек.

"Русскоязычная община прочно встала на карту Америки, а ее представители стали людьми, которыми гордится нация. Богатая культурная традиция - это тот самый мост, которые соединяет Россию и США, народы и континенты", - говорит Марина Ковалева, спредседатель российско-американского фонда.

THE MAYOR OF NEW YORK CONGRATULATES THE RUSSIAN AMERICAN COMMUNITY: YOU HAVE GIVEN US THE HELICOPTER, TV, AND GOOGLE

Russians in the United States have contributed greatly to its development. The mayor of New York Michael Bloomberg recognized this fact as he congratulated the Russian community of the metropolitan area in connection with the current "Russian Heritage Festival", reports the Russian News and Information Agency "Novosti".

The ceremony honoring the Russians of New York took place in the main art center of the financial capital of the world - in the magnificent Egyptian Hall of the Metropolitan Museum, with its altar and ancient sphinxes reflected in the smooth surface of a decorative pool. The "Russian Heritage Festival" is being presented for the sixth time. It is organized by the Russian American Foundation which is known for its projects with the Bolshoi Theater, the New Moscow Opera, and the "Sovremennik" Theater on Broadway, with support from the city.

"The Russian-speaking community of the most varied religious groups has had a very large influence on the culture of the New York, from Staten Island to Brighton Beach. Russians have given America the helicopter, television, and Google," said Bloomberg at the opening ceremony.

He noted the contributions to the development of world progress which immigrants from Russia have made, such as Igor Sikorsky, who patented the helicopter in New York in 1910 and Vladimir Zworykin and David Sarnoff, who created and put into production television sets in the 1930's. Bloomberg also recognized as Russian the empire of Google which was founded in 1998 by two students from Stanford University, Larry Page and Sergei Brin, an émigré from the USSR.

The correspondent from "Novosti" also adds that Bloomberg could have mentioned the Russian contributions to the New York ballet, opera, filmmaking, music, and art. There are about 200,000 Russian-speakers in New York and the surrounding areas.

"The Russian-speaking community is well established on the map of America, and its representatives have become people the nation is proud of. A rich cultural tradition is the very bridge which unites Russia and the United States, all peoples and continents," notes Marina Kovalyov, the president of the Russian American Foundation.

Mary made the "torte ala babushka" for the most recent meeting of the Board of Directors and it was excellent. Now it's time for you to add to our cookbook project, and you might even think about a title for this book.

A Visit to Babushka in Kiev

Many years ago Gene and I were very privileged to be able to visit his grandmother in Kiev. We considered ourselves very lucky to be able to go to his home and be able to be on the same "street where he lived".

We were in the house where Gene was born and babushka still lived in the room where his nursery had been. These were difficult times in the Soviet Union in the late 60's. Food was scarce – ingredients were almost impossible to find. A family lived in each room of their old apartment. The occupants shared one bath, one kitchen - one way of life. They all shared the toilet, the sink and stove privileges.

Babushka, being as wonderful as she was – tried to be as hospitable as all Russians are. She wanted to make a Czarski torte (now known to us as "Walnut Torte ala Babushka") for a "пир на весь мир" (feast for the world). Ingredients for the torte were almost nonexistent. Flour was not available for cakes – only black bread could be found in the shops – sugar was only beet sugar and even that was almost extinct. Eggs were rationed and needed to be acquired by "friends".

With much searching and many phone calls to Moscow – eggs were obtained – walnuts were cracked and chopped and vanilla beans were even found in a secret jar. A magnificent creation was put together to please everyone's palate. The torte was especially wonderful since we had to get in line for the use of the oven and of course share this creation with the entire apartment inhabitants.

Walnut Torte – ala Babushka

2 cups of ground walnuts
8 eggs – separated
1 cup of sugar
Vanilla

Chop the walnuts – beat the eggs separately – add vanilla and sugar to the egg yolks – fold in the beaten egg whites – put into a 9-inch baking pan (lined with wax paper) and bake at 350F for 25 minutes. Dress with butter icing if you like or cover with apricot jam, vodka or brandy.
